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It's Confusing!

Cage-free, *Free-range*, *Pasture-raised – What's the Difference?* Shopping for eggs can be confusing. Let's simplify the differences:

Cage free, free range and pasture-raised refer only to the *amount of space* the hens are provided**.

Caged: the hens never see the light of day and are *kept in cages* for their entire egglaying lives. The package will not state "caged". If the carton does not indicate otherwise, assume they are from caged birds.

Cage-Free: is regulated by the USDA, but simply indicates that the hens do not live in cages. Cage free *does not* specify or indicate how much space the hens have, or whether or not they see the outdoors. Usually these hens are confined in a barn or similar facility and their living conditions can be cramped. Definitely better than caged.

Free-Range: is also a term regulated by the USDA and it means hens were given continuous access to the outdoors during their production cycle. However, this does not guarantee that a hen *ever actually stepped foot outside*, it just means there was a way for them to do so. Some seldom get to see the light of day. It's a small step better than cage free.

Pasture-Raised: is the best option, for welfare and health. The hens tend to be let out of the barns early in the morning and called back in before nightfall.

** The terms **organic, non-gmo, vegetarian and omega-3 enriched** refer only to the feed, not the conditions.
